
master of management studies alumni career survey





In October 2017 we surveyed Master of Management Studies (MMS) program alumni, including the Foundations of Business program (2010–2017) and the Duke Kunshan University program (2015–2017) to solicit their feedback on how the MMS program had impacted their careers. A strong response rate of 40% was achieved, with 383 alumni sharing their career progress.

# TOP 5 COUNTRIES MMS GRADS ARE WORKING IN

The majority of MMS graduates are currently working in the United States or China, with 1% or fewer of remaining graduates working in other locations across multiple continents.

# TOP 5 CITIES MMS GRADS ARE WORKING IN

Within the US and China, New York City has the greatest concentration of MMS alumni, while Shanghai follows at a distance. The remainder of the top 5 cities are located on the East or West coasts of the United States.

I come from a family business background and was unsure if I wanted to change career paths or go back to my family business, and I feel like the skill set I gained in the MMS program prepared me to go either way. ### **INDUSTRIES & FUNCTIONS**

MMS alumni jobs are concentrated in three industries. Over two-thirds of MMS graduates currently work in the Financial Services (30%), Consulting (18%), or Technology (17%) industries. About 5% of alumni work in Retail/Wholesale, 4% are in Non-Profit/Education, and the remaining 2% are split across a wide range of fields.

Similarly, three-fourths of MMS graduates work in four functions: Finance (28%), Consulting (22%), Marketing (12%), and Operations (12%). Those working in consulting and operations are more likely to have had pre-Fuqua work experience than those in finance or marketing.



Almost two-thirds of these MMS graduates are no longer in the same position they held immediately after the program.


### **CURRENT JOB THE SAME AS FIRST JOB AFTER FUQUA?**





### POSITION TITLE RELATED TO WORK EXPERIENCE

As expected, the longer an alumnus has been in the workforce, the higher their current position title.

For those out of Fugua for 7-8 years, 30% are at the assistant, associate, or director level or above.

Approximately 70% of MMS grads in the classes of 2012 and 2013 are in the senior analyst to manager range in title.

Alumni with three to four years of work experience are largely (60%) senior analysts or analysts



### the rewards

For those who have progressed from their first job after Fuqua to a new one, financial rewards have grown rapidly. A significantly greater proportion (roughly 60%) of the MMS alumni who have a different job than the first one they held after the MMS program have salaries of \$80K or above.



## before fuqua vs. current job





The degree itself worked well for me. My current employer, and several other (though not all) potential employers, viewed it as an MBA equivalent. The network is the only drawback in my view, which is not as valuable as the MBA network given that MMSers are less experienced, more junior, and have smaller networks of their own. The MMS degree can be what you make of it. If you present yourself as an MBA equivalent in terms of presence, skill set, and maturity, the fact that it's not an MBA will not hold you back."



### where did they come from?




The MMS program draws slightly more domestic students than international students. Note that this includes the MMS: DKU program. However, the data for MMS: DKU is only for 3 class years: 2015, when the program began, 2016, and 2017.

Roughly 25% of MMS alumni had full-time work experience before they entered the degree program. The majority of these alums had between 6 months to 2 years of full-time experience.

Student responses when asked if they had pursued or have plans to pursue further graduate education





Roughly one-fourth of MMS graduates have either already pursued or plan to pursue additional education after their MMS program. Just over one-third haven't and have no plans to study further, while also about one-third are undecided.

Of those who have already pursued further education, one-quarter continued their business education with an MBA. Both a JD and an MD were pursued by 10%. Almost half, however, sought some other advanced education than these degrees.

Of those who are planning to pursue further education, almost two-thirds plan to get an MBA. About 20% say they will pursue a PhD or an |D.
